HOW TO LAY CARPET ON STAIRS

A carpeted staircase would be much safer than a hard surface since they're usually less slippery. Even if both seem to occur, the padding of carpeting could prevent serious injuries too. What's more, carpeted stairs are quieter, because they absorb the impact of footsteps, which is important in such a heavily trafficked area.

Laying carpet on stairs can be a difficult and time-consuming task, especially for novices. That is why most people would suggest calling in an expert. However, if you would prefer to carry out the work yourself, it can be done.

PREPARATION FOR LAYING CARPET ON STAIRS

If you already have carpeting installed, make sure you remove that first. It's also important that you clear away any old underlay, along with nails, tacks, and staples.

To calculate how much carpet is required, you need to measure the size of your staircases. Start by measuring a single step from the bottom of the riser to the back of the tread. Make sure you measure the nose too, which is where the tread hangs over the nosing. Just to be safe, you should add an extra inch to this measurement before multiplying it by the number of stairs.
